

## Development Guideline for La Digue Foreshore

The built environment of La Digue must be done with great carefulness. Being smaller than Praslin and Mahé, construction projects on this island should consist of smaller footprints that are well integrated into the natural environment. Examples of such developments are illustrated below.

### Leisure Infrastructures



Tree houses for relaxation activities such as playing dominoes or local spa.
